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Directors' report

The directors present their annual report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2006.

Principal activities

EURIM is a UK-based not-for-profit group concerned with the politics of the "Information Society" in a UK and European context. It brings together politicians (MPs, MEPs and Peers), advisors (including officials as observers) and Industry (corporations, trade associations, professional bodies, not-for-profits etc.) to review issues and identify where work is needed (whether to set the agenda for debate, or to better scrutinise proposals already under way). Where there is consensus, EURIM works to secure timely and effective action at whatever level necessary.

Business review

During the course of the year, activities were focussed on the following themes: Knowledge Economy (including UK Competitiveness, Intellectual Property Rights and Open Source issues); the use of ICT to help deliver public services when, where and how most needed; Internet Safety and E-Crime; Personal Identity and Data Sharing; and Communications regulation (including the TV Without Frontiers and other policy reviews).

Over 40 meetings were organised in the course of the year including for MPs on identity technologies and systems, shared services and child protection, with PITCOM, APIG, the Communications and Mobile Groups and ITSPA on Internet issues, to assist studies by the Parliamentary Office of Science and Technology and with officials and policy advisors with Cabinet Office, DCA, DWP, Home Office and Treasury on Personal Identity, Data Sharing and Shared Service Delivery. We worked with Home Office on E-Crime, Nominet on Internet Governance, Intellect and SOCITM on the public sector IT success and the Westminster Media Forum and E-business Regulatory Alliance on Communications Regulation. Meeting summaries were sent to members and placed on www.eurim.org.uk. A study was conducted into Knowledge Economy issues. Details of consultations were circulated to those who had registered interest and submissions made to the Transformational Government Consultation, the Internet Governance Forum and House of Lords Select Committee Enquiry on Personal Internet Safety.

Statement of directors' responsibilities in respect of the Directors' Report and the Financial Statements

Independent auditors' report to the Members of EURIM

We have audited the financial statements of EURIM for the year ended 31 December 2006 which comprise the income and expenditure account and the balance sheet and the related notes. These financial statements have been prepared under the accounting policies set out therein.

This report is made solely to the company's members, as a body, in accordance with section 235 of the Companies Act 1985. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the company and the company's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the Directors' Report is not consistent with the financial statements, if the company has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding directors' remuneration and other transactions is not disclosed.

We read the Directors' Report and consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements within it.

Basis of audit opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland) issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgments made by the directors in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the company's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

Opinion

In our opinion:

- the financial statements give a true and fair view, in accordance with UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice, of the state of the company's affairs as at 31 December 2006 and of its deficit for the year then ended;
